
I'm sure it would be appreciated by your Observer if those associates that pass their qualification could put a few words together to thank their Observer.

Drivers be warned:

Do not leave your engine running to melt the ice and then head back in doors to keep warm.





There is a handy trick you can try. Use White Wine Vinegar which you can buy cheaply enough at any supermarket. Spread it on the screen and side windows the night before you want to use your car. Pour a mixture of three parts vinegar one part water on to your windshield and other glass areas and you will have a frost free screen etc. White Vinegar is often used as a cleaning product and can be used to clean the dirt and haze from your windscreen. Put the mixture in a spray bottle and keep it handy.

Driving licence changes for 'ZEV' vans:

Proposed changes by government to driving licences for drivers of large alternatively fuelled vans. Because of the push towards net zero emissions, this change will apply to zero emission vehicles (ZEVs) - those powered by battery alone.

The reason is, the batteries are taking up part of the 3500kg payload. At one time some of us were eligible to drive a 7.5 ton truck straight from passing our test but this is no longer the case. Disabled user vehicles would get an additional 750kg.

All of this still has to go through Parliament and at the moment would only apply to Britain except for Northern Ireland. The EU has similar ideas.

Xmas Lights:

The 58th A G M of Norfolk & Norwich Group of Advanced Motorists was held on Wednesday 10th January 2024 at The Pavilion, Oaklands Road, Cringleford.



The Chair welcomed the 33 members who attended and thanked his fellow Committee Members for their efforts and support throughout the past year and the Observers for their continued commitment to the group. All members also deserve thanks for their continued support where subscriptions are the bulk of our group's income. The Committee has had to grapple with issues during the year including safeguarding the group's financial future and ways to recruit new members. The groups by-laws dictate that the Chairman can only remain in post for a total of a three-year period which meant his tenure expired at this 2024 AGM.



The exiting Chairman, Keith Mace, said that in more ways than one the group was entering a new era and hoped a successful one. He said that we had not attended as many events as usual with the Mobile Display Unit but hoped that this would improve in the coming year as this used to be one of our main recruitment channels. We must be conscious of those running costs and at the same time get out there and fly the flag. Finally, Keith Mace wished the new team all the best for the future and stated that it had not been easy finding new faces for the Committee, but since having now filled most of the vacancies this puts the group in a good position to exploit new ideas and opportunities. He believed that the light in the tunnel was not just a train coming the other way!

The Secretary, Martin Woodhouse added his thanks to those of the Chairman and said that although the brunt of the work is carried out by the Committee, together with our hard-working Observers, every single member makes this Group one of the most respected and successful ones within the IAM RoadSmart Group network.

The Group financial year runs from 1st October to 30st September. Reflecting that, period 2023 has been the hardest year for enrolling new members,14 in total. 7 test passes 3 of which were for bikes. Apart from subscriptions the only other money the group receives is £36.50 for each new associate which is why unfortunately an increase to £15 in membership subscription has had to be instated this year - the first increase since 2014 and still one of the lowest of any of the IAM RoadSmart groups.

We currently have 15 active car observers and 3 bike observers. Members were reminded to inform the Membership Secretary of any change of address so as to avoid being taken off the Wheels mailing list.



If members wish to bring anything to the Committee's attention they may send it to our new Secretary, Elke Martin, to be included on the next Committee Meeting Agenda.

The exiting secretary, Martin Woodhouse, made it clear that this is "your Group" so please tell the Committee of anything you think is useful; be it comments, constructive criticism, ideas for Speakers, visits or events to attend would be most welcome.

Associate Scheme Coordinator (Bikes), Paul Southwell was recently recruited at the Committee Meeting where he was warmly welcomed.



13th March - Roly Batchelor - MOT Testing, Facts & Myths

One of our own, who, I am sure most of you will know! Roly has kindly offered to give us an insight into MOT's which must register interest with everyone. He tells me he recently did a two day training presentation on this subject but has promised to keep it to just the usual length of time for us!

10th April - Graham Feast - Road safety consultant - 'Transport, traffic, safety & roads'

Graham is a UK based Road Safety Consultant. He is an experienced Road Safety Practitioner starting his career with Worthing Borough Council in 1974. In 1984 he moved to West Sussex County Council where he became Senior Road Safety Officer with specific responsibilities for Education Development. He was appointed County Road Safety Officer for Northamptonshire in 1989, a post which he held until May 2001 joining the Institute of Advanced Motorists as Head of Road Safety until the end of 2003. He is qualified to teach at both Further and Adult Education Centres.

In addition, he is an Honorary Life Member of the Association of Road Risk Management, Honorary Member of the Institute of Large Goods Vehicle Driving Instructors, and a Fellow of the Institute of Master Tutors of Driving. He spent 12 years as Chairman of the UK National Road Safety Committee, from which he retired in May 2023. He has been Vice Chairman of the Local Authority Road Safety Officers Association (now Road Safety GB), a past Secretary and founder member of the Association of National Driver Improvement Scheme Providers and a former member of the Prince Michael Road Safety Awards Advisory Panel. He was a member of the Steering Committee set up to develop the Driving for Better Business Programme.

I don't think we have had a more qualified and high-level consultant in this field provide us with a presentation before. Indeed.

8th May - Wally Webb - 40 years with BBC Radio Norfolk

Wally Webb is best known as a presenter on BBC Radio Norfolk – and perhaps as the inspiration for Steve Coogan's Alan Partridge – but he's had a long and varied career.

When BBC Radio Norfolk first came to Norwich they turned him down but he persisted and a chance meeting gave him his opportunity. His time with the BBC started when there was freedom to create spoofs and play his own choice of music. Over four decades Wally produced many programmes and visited every part of Norfolk, meeting innumerable stars, getting involved in banger racing and wrestling and adapting as new technology began to change the face of the industry. Still going strong in his seventies, the Covid pandemic finally brought his broadcasting career to an end. Well, not quite.



Our meeting venue has easy access for the disabled. Masters Seminar

IAM RoadSmart recently held a Masters seminar over Microsoft Teams. The purpose was to raise awareness of common issues that often appear when candidates are on test.

The Masters is, in principal, the same as the advanced driving test in that both follow the system of car control and are based on Roadcraft. Before a candidate can take the Masters course they must have passed the IAM advanced driving test, therefore any issues that are being displayed during the Masters test are likely to be the same issues that the candidate has carried forward from their advanced driving test, so I thought it might be helpful to share some of the issues identified by examiners during Masters tests to help you understand common areas where Associates might need particular attention.

Masters candidates (and Observers) are expected to have a sound knowledge of both Roadcraft and The Highway Code. Obviously an in-depth Roadcraft knowledge isn't required of an Associate, but an Associate must have a sound knowledge of The Highway Code, in particular they must know all the rules identified by the use of the words 'MUST/MUST NOT' as these refer to legal requirements.

IPSGA must be applied in that order, although the information 'phase' runs throughout the system. What examiners don't want to see are rushed gear changes because the speed of approach to a hazard is too high, perhaps leading to a second braking phase, or braking while entering a bend. The braking and gear selection must be completed before the hazard, but not so early that a candidate needs to speed up before the hazard. Drivers of cars with automatic gear boxes must not still be on the brakes when entering a hazard and/or steering into a bend.

Block gear changing is encouraged, but going from 1st to 3rd then from 3rd to 5th, as is sometimes seen, is not considered good block changing. Use the gears sequentially until the desired speed is obtained, then select the gear for that speed, for example, 1st, 2nd, 3rd then 5th missing 4th gear would be considered the correct application of block changing.

Failing to make good progress is something that is often encountered. I think the Masters test probably places slightly more emphasis on this than is required for the advanced test, but I think it's still worth highlighting what the examiners are looking for when it

comes to progress. A lack of progress is not reaching the speed limit when it is safe to do so. It was stressed it is not an economy drive, but neither is it a thrash around the countryside. There is a balance to be struck between progress and restraint, but generally the examiners like to see what is referred to as the 'three ups'. These are, getting up to the speed limit, getting up the gearbox and getting up to the vehicle in front. This means using the best revrange of the gearbox, or for automatics, selecting the correct mode, e.g. sport mode if appropriate.

Overtaking is something that is of particular importance in the Masters, but an Associate should also be able to describe both the three-stage and single-stage overtaking processes. A well-executed overtake is very satisfying, but in practice opportunities may not always present themselves. Being able to demonstrate a safe and systematic overtake should the opportunity arise is an essential requirement of anyone who wants to be considered an advanced driver.

Cornering issues seem to be quite common. These include such things as slowing in the bend, timing of the acceleration phase, not matching the gear for the speed and inaccurate application of the limit point. This can lead to Associates being slower out of a corner if they're not in the correct gear and haven't identified when the limit point is starting to move away so that they can begin the acceleration phase. By getting the gear and acceleration phase correct the Associate can effectively 'sling-shot' themselves out of a corner. Basically, it's better to be slow in and fast out, than fast in and slow out. Don't forget the emphasis must always be on being able to stop on your own side of the road within the distance that can be seen to be clear. Allow a margin for error when assessing the entry speed for a bend.

I know that these issues are probably well known to you, but it's interesting to hear that they still occur occasionally, even at the level of the Masters.

There were some other issues raised, such as some around positioning, but I think these are probably best left to those who are on the Masters course.

<u>10th December</u> Bubblecar Museum

I blame our venerable secretary Martin. As we arrived at our destination, I had picked up his latest email in which he had commented on the better weather. 
After about an hour we departed to our various destinations leaving the afternoon free to get those domestic chores done and watch the football.

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
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In January 2022 there were several changes in the Highway Code.
